

Considering and monitoring changes in these key areas from the start will lessen the risk of non-compliance.








Classification Factors for Understanding Compliance, Scope and Protection

Key Actions, Factors and Enforcers


Understanding who is the enforcer and policy-maker at each point in the journey is essential, as is understanding who is the regulated or responsible entity at any point.

Actions that food business operators must take:

- Identify your market's Competent Authority (CA)
- Trusted trader schemes and a history of good compliance

Factors that affect competent authorities:

- ► There is currently little collaboration between CA's
- Questions over funding and commitment remain, especially in GB








Managing Risks: An Overview

Non-compliance Triggers

For Food Business Operators (FBO's), assessing risk is a dynamic and skilled operation required to maintain compliance and should be based on broader factors than might be first anticipated.






Managing Risks: Setting Priorities

Horizon Scanning & Accurate Risk Assessment

FBO's should ensure horizon scanning results in accurate risk assessment. Prioritisation will ease strains on resourcing.

Cost of enforcement versus cost of compliance?

EU and GB Drivers of Regulatory Change

Key Diverging Regulation Risks

Following Brexit, EU and UK (GB) Regulatory divergence has created additional Horizon Scanning for Businesses.




Staying Ahead of Policy and Regulatory Change

- Information vs Application (business specific requirements)


